

## Joomla newbie seeks advice on JMS

I've read great things about Joomla and am considering installing it on my hosted account (using the Elefante Script installer).

My host provides a limited number of MySQL databases, so I thought I'd do well to see whether Joomla would manage the design of multiple websites from a single MySQL database.

At this point, the only websites I've ever designed have been from hand-coded HTML and PHP. They have been very rudimentary. I want to see if Joomla will help me design and build a website that allows authorized individuals to post their own content without me having to do it for them.

I googled and found JMS. My question is this: is there anything I need to be aware of when installing the original Joomla script to ensure that JMS will work properly for multiple websites hosted from a single MySQL database.

I have ZERO experience with Joomla (haven't even installed it yet). I just want to make sure I head in the right direction right from the start.

When working with a single DB, the key element during the installation of Joomla is the usage of a specific table prefix (ie. master\_) instead of the default one 'jos\_'.

This is recommended to avoid that you destroy in the future the master website in case where you forgot to specify a table prefix for a slave site.

All my websites are very small (the most popular rates a "3" on the Google scale) so I'm hoping their servers can handle the load.

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Sorry but I don't know 50webs.net.

So I can not tell you if their infrastructure may work.

I suggest that apply the "hello world" procedure as described in the tutorial step 7

This will help you identify if they accept the Symbolic Link

Second element that you have to check is the type of MySQL they use. Is it a MySQL 5.0 or higher ? If YES, this mean that theoretically the JMS sharing functionality could work.

Does they use cPanel product for the hosting administration or does they use their own tools.

Standard cPanel tool has a bug that does not allow define MySQL user with enough privileges to share MySQL table. When working with cPanel and that you are not the administrator of the server, you may have to request the hosting company support to grant your MySQL user manually with enough privileges.

Concerning the workload, JMS has not a very high overhead as the decision are precompute when the slave site are defined.

JMS can very quickly take the decision in production.

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
